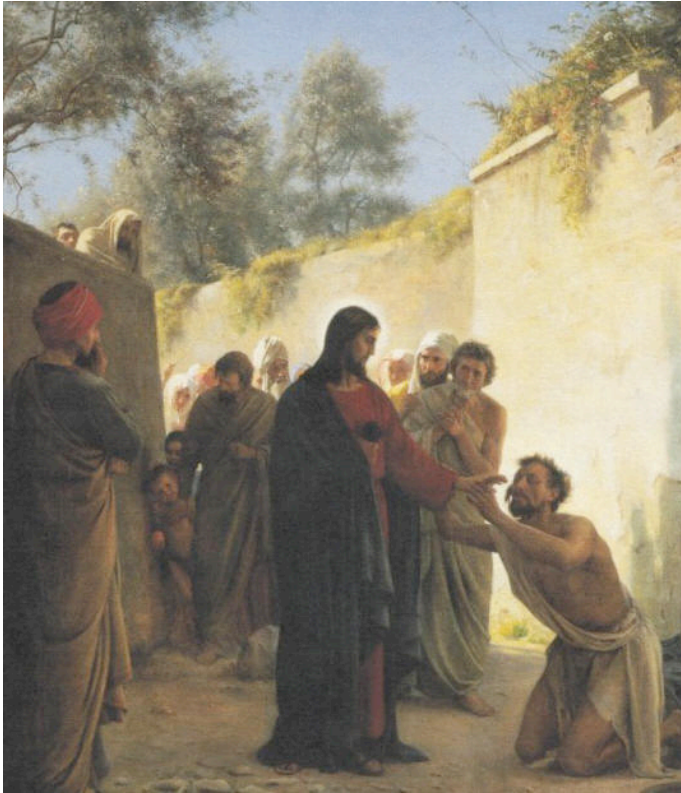

We extend welcome to all parents and other family members who are worshipping with us today. In recent weeks, we've journeyed through Mark 10 and seen the rich young man walk away from Jesus, and Jesus' disciples bicker about who will sit closest to Jesus in heaven. In today's gospel lesson there is irony in the chapter as a blind man shows true perception by calling out loudly and casting himself on Jesus' mercy for healing. The lessons from Job and Hebrews also have an emphasis on God's mercy. In Job, God blesses the very places that had been the source of Job's suffering, and in Hebrews we are offered encouragement in our struggles with the words that Jesus "always lives to make intercession" for us.

At the close of today's service, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated in the Memorial Chapel located to the left of the chancel. Immediately following the Lord's Supper, a service of prayer for healing will also be held. The service consists of prayers for healing and wholeness, with anointing and laying on of hands. All are invited.

The congregation is asked to remain silent during the prelude as a time of prayer and meditation.

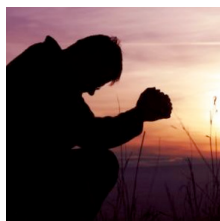

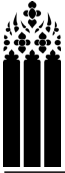
